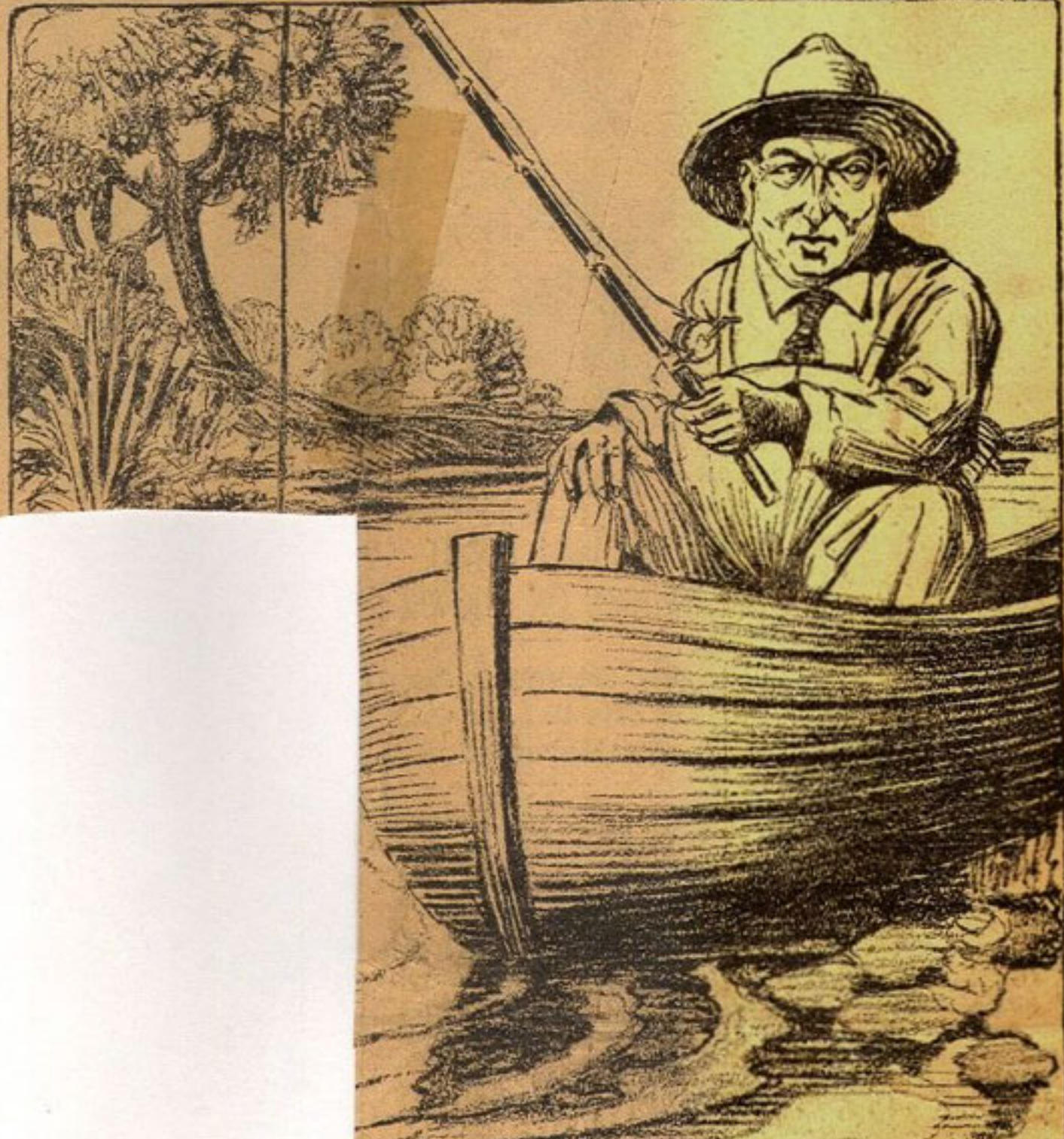
## SENATORS GROW PEEVISH UNDER WAR TAX DEBATE

### GOVERNOR COMES HERE

Confers With Attorney General on Powers in Crisis and Punishment of Any Who Obstruct.

### DOVES DODGE SHADOWS

Peace Advocates, Officially Adjourned, Scurry Around Busily, but Soldiers Refuse to Notice Them.

Governor Lowden and Attorney General Brundage conferred in Chicago last night over the city's shameless mayor. At the conclusion of their meeting it was announced that the pacifist situation was well in hand. Chicago was assured that there will be no further happenings such as that of Sunday.

### Day's Developments In Purging Chicago Of 'Big Bill' and Doves

GOVERNOR LOWDEN visited Chicago last night and gave personal attention to the disgraceful situation created by "Big Bill" and the pacifist rabbits.

ATTORNEY GENERAL BRUNDAGE pointed out that mayor may be indictable for palpable omission of duty and that governor has whip hand on the Illinois situation through use of the unorganized militia—every citizen between the ages of 18 and 45 years.

STATE'S ATTORNEY HOYNE said it is dangerous in these times to open the gates of the city to agitators and disturbers who try to stir antagonism to the federal government.

SECURITY LEAGUE and clubs called emergency meetings of officials to demand Thompson's ouster if possible, and if not that all power be taken from him. State Council of Defense and citizens' war board also planned action.
